**12th World Scout Moot, 2004**

**9th World Scout Youth Forum &  
37th World Scout Conference, 2005**

**21st World Scout Jamboree, 2007**

1. In January 1998, World Scout Bureau Circular No. 3 called for invitations from National Scout Organizations to host the four above-mentioned world events. The Circular indicated that the deadline date for receiving formal invitations was 31 December 1998.
2. In September 1995, the World Scout Committee adopted *Basic Requirements and Guidelines for World Scout Youth Events* (Forum, Jamboree and Moot). These new documents were communicated to the NSOs which expressed the intention to invite one or another of the four events.
3. In March 1999, the World Scout Committee reviewed the invitations which have been received, in the light of the different Resolutions concerning these world events adopted by previous World Scout Conferences; in particular, Resolution 10/85 on the four events, Resolution 22/90 on World Scout Conferences, Resolution 10/93 on World Scout Youth Forum, and Resolution 20/93 on World Scout Jamboree and World Scout Moot.

4. The World Scout Committee therefore decided to bring before the Conference the following invitations:

**12th WORLD SCOUT MOOT**  
**AUSTRIA**

- Proposed date** End of July - beginning of August 2004.
- Proposed main venue** Scout Camp St. Georgen/Attergau in the Salzkammergut,  
(Res. 10/85) near the lake Attersee (40 km from Salzburg).
- Educational objectives** A momentum for quality youth work of the Scout Movement.  
(Res. 20/93)  
Developing greater understanding, tolerance and co-operation.  
Experience in cultural variety and community involvement.  
Walking, exploring, experiencing in small international groups.  
Fun and recreation.
- Community involvement** "What we want to do is to see how young Scouts deal with  
(Res. 20/93) culture, religion, their social surroundings, social co-determination, work and spare time."
- Proposed programme** 1. International project groups all over Austria (five days).  
(Res. 10/85) 2. All Moot participants get together in a camp in the middle of Austria, in St. Georgen/Attergau (five days).

# 12th WORLD SCOUT MOOT CHINA, SCOUTS OF

**Proposed date** 1 - 11 August 2004.

**Proposed main venue** Hualien, on the East Coast of Taiwan Island. A vast and green campus university site between Taroko Mountain National Park and the Pacific Ocean.  
(Res. 10/85)

**Educational objectives** "Under the Motto: "Scouting: Unlimited Challenges", the event's objectives emphasize the need of young adults to face, in pursuing and reinventing every day the life for tomorrow, challenging issues such as environmental protection, cultural development, racial segregation, religious practice and the sharing of new technologies. The challenges of existing gaps are all without limits. It is therefore necessary for young adults to understand and be prepared to face these challenges in order to bridge the gaps."  
(Res. 20/93)

**Community involvement** 1. During the expedition programme throughout the country, participants will have the opportunity to get acquainted with the aboriginal communities of the Island as well as with the traditional Chinese culture.  
(Res. 20/93) 2. On-site, the Global Development Village will be set up using the facilities of the nearby Dong Hwa University. Global issues of common concern such as conservation of nature, health care, human rights, international understanding and peace will be discussed by the participants through interactive exhibitions and workshops.

**Proposed programme** *Day 1:* Get together of all participants at Taoyuan Scout Camp, near Taipei International Airport. Opening ceremony.  
(Res. 10/85) *Day 2 to Day 7:* 10 different circuits for expedition throughout the country in international patrols.  
*Day 8 to Day 10:* All participants assemble at Hualien for on-site activities (project adventure, Scout-O-Rama, Scouts' concerns, GDV).  
*Day 11:* Closing.

**Facilitating NSOs' participation** Estimated average registration fee: US\$ 500.  
(Res. 23/90) Provision will be made for participants from less privileged countries to benefit from the solidarity of the World Scout family (Operation Dong Hwa).

A Post-Moot programme, including home hospitality in major cities around the country will be organized for participants who would like to make the most of their visit to Taiwan.

**Proposed dates** July 2005.

**Proposed venue** In the heart of Kowloon peninsula, at the Scout Association of Hong Kong Headquarters.  
(Res. 10/85)

**Proposed facilities & Working methods** Baden-Powell International House, Hong Kong.  
(Res. 22/90, 24/90 & 24/93)  
Main meeting hall (capacity 500 persons, 300 in classroom style).  
Several meeting rooms for working groups on 8th to 11th floor.  
Possibility for one-day excursion by boat to surrounding islands.

**Accommodation** 535 air-conditioned rooms with panoramic view of Victoria harbour and Kowloon Park.  
(Res. 22/90)  
Coffee lounge. Chinese restaurant.

**Facilitating NSOs' participation** Meetings and accommodation in a single complex belonging to the Scout Association.  
(Res. 22/90 & 23/90) Attractive package cost for accommodation and full board.

**Proposed date** July 2005.

**Proposed venue** On Kowloon Bay, near the former Kai Tak International Airport.  
(Res. 10/85)

**Proposed facilities & Working methods** Hong Kong International Trade & Exhibition Centre (HITEC). Vast Convention Centre opened in 1995.  
(Res. 22/90, 24/90 & 24/93) Plenary hall for 1,000 participants in classroom style.  
Several meeting rooms for working groups. Office space.  
Exhibition areas.  
In-house restaurants.  
Possibility of a one-day excursion by boat to surrounding islands.

**Accommodation** Conference hotel: Baden-Powell International House, at 20 minutes by bus from HITEC.  
(Res. 22/90) Also possibility for extra accommodation at Regal Kai Tak Hotel (400 high standard rooms) at 10 minutes by bus from HITEC.  
Special bus transportation system will be organized.

**Facilitating NSOs' participation** Attractive rates for accommodation.  
(Res. 22/90 & 23/90) Indicative 1999 special rate per person per night:

**Proposed dates** Second half of September 2005.

**Proposed venue** Hotel Palm Marina, situated at the edge of fine sandy beach in El Kantaoui Port, near Sousse (90 minutes drive by motorway from Tunis-Carthage International Airport).  
(Res. 10/85)

**Proposed facilities & Working methods** Plenary hall (capacity 300 participants in classroom style).  
(Res. 22/90, 24/90 & 24/93) Several meeting rooms for working groups and possibility to use outside areas in the garden and near the beach (due to usual very pleasant weather in that period of the year).  
Possibility of using the nearby Scout Training Camp at Hamam-Sousse at short distance. Several natural and historical sites adequate for excursions and outside working sessions.

**Accommodation** Hotel Palm Marina, 224 bedrooms with balcony and sea view.  
(Res. 22/90) Dining room and coffee shop.  
All facilities of an elegant 4-star hotel in a quiet and natural protected environment.  
Possibility of using Borj Cedria National Scout Camp, on the Tunis Bay, for pre- and post-Forum hospitality.

**Facilitating NSOs' participation** Meetings and accommodation in a single complex.  
(Res. 22/90 & 23/90) Competitive rates for accommodation and full board.

### **TUNISIA**

**Proposed dates** Second half of September 2005.

**Proposed venue** Sousse, on the Mediterranean Coast (90 minutes drive by  
(Res. 10/85) motorway from Tunis-Carthage International Airport).

**Proposed facilities  
& Working methods** Riadh Palms Hotel. 4-star hotel on the edge of the beach.  
(Res. 22/90, 24/90 & 24/93) Plenary hall, present capacity: 800 persons, to be extended in  
year 2000 to 1,200 (800 in classroom style).

Several meeting rooms for working groups. Office space.

Exhibition area around the swimming pool, under traditional tents.

Possibility of using the nearby Scout Training Camp at Hamam-Sousse. Several natural and historical sites adequate for one-day outside working session (at maximum one hour drive from El Kantaoui).

In case of bad weather that day (although at this period of the year the weather is very pleasant) possibility of using the large Exhibition Hall of the Sousse Municipality.

**Accommodation** Riadh Palms Hotel: 495 rooms (an additional 150 to be added  
(Res. 22/90) in the year 2000) with balcony and sea view.

Large capacity restaurant. Coffee shop. Vast swimming pool. Free access to the beach.

**Facilitating NSOs' participation** Meetings and accommodation in a single complex.  
(Res. 22/90 & 23/90) Very competitive rates for accommodation and meals.

Indicative 1999 special rate per night per person:

Single room, full board (3 meals) included: US\$ 65

Possibility for lower rates in 3-star hotels at 5 minutes walking distance from Riadh Palms.

## 21st WORLD SCOUT JAMBOREE UNITED KINGDOM

**Proposed dates** First half of August 2007.

**Proposed venue** Hylands Park, Chelmsford (Essex) at 30 minutes drive from London Stansted Airport, and two hours drive from Heathrow, Gatwick and Luton Airports. The ports of Harwich and Felixstowe are 50 miles (83 km) away. Easy access by train from London.  
(Res. 10/85)

A central feature of the Park is Hylands House. The Park, a Chelmsford Borough Council's property, is currently used for informal recreation, organized events and for educational purposes.

& Educational Objectives**  
(Res. 20/93)

The 21st World Scout Jamboree:

- will celebrate the achievements of 100 years of Scouting
- will demonstrate the unity of World Scouting
- will confirm the unique value of Scouting in the 21st Century
- will be enjoyable and beneficial to the participants
- will confirm Scouting's commitment to the natural environment
- will show Scouting's concern for the local, national and fabric of the local host community
- will provide a showcase for Scouting as a professional Organization
- will advance the development of Scouting in the U.K.
